#### WELCOME NEW MEMBERS

The Charlton Historical Society would like to welcome our latest new members. First, we welcome back Lynda and Richard Battenhausen who now live on Florence Ave. Lynda is the granddaughter of Frank Lafforthun and she has generously donated numerous miniatures handmade by Frank. Lynda and our Curator, Bill Wehrle, have been working numerous hours in the museum to restore the miniatures and set up a display of this folk art in one of the cabinets, plus restore the display that Frank made depicting how the Hamlet's Main Street may have looked in the 1860's. Both displays will be wonderful additions to the museum and we thank them both for all the effort that they have put into this restoration project. We welcome Lynette and Bill Metz who are the new neighbors of the Walkers on Sacandaga Road. Many of us had the pleasure of meeting them at the Moveable Feast in April. Lynette entertained us with the interesting story about her miniature horse. We welcome our 4<sup>th</sup> member from California, Fran Coughlin of Atascadero, who just joined with a generous donation. Fran is descended from many famous founding families of Charlton. Her ancestors are Rev. William Clark and John Holmes. John Holmes was elected as an Elder of the Freehold Presbyterian Church in their first election of Elders in 1787. He also built a sawmill in 1774, located where Crane Street crosses the Alplaus, and brought his family to Charlton in 1775. Fran says that she is also descended from the Conde and Kirby families. Fran and Bonnie Cook, also from California, have separate plans to visit us in late June. Bonnie's husband, Alan Lincoln Cook, is descended from Charlton's Cook family.

#### **MUSEUM DISPLAYS**

Curator Bill Wehrle has been busy readying the museum for the season opener on Founders Day Weekend. He has been working on the exhibition of Frank Lafforthun's works of art. Following is Bill's description of the exhibit.

Frank Lafforthan created this display as a representation of how our Main Street may have looked in the 1860's. It was donated to the museum in 1977. It had deteriorated over the years and suffered damage during storage on top of the schoolhouse cabinets. Our sincere gratitude goes out to Frank's Granddaughter, Lynda Battenhausen. for her supervision and artistic restoration talents as well as the donation of Frank's folk art in the cabinet on the north side. Some damage is still evident, but we felt it is more important to preserve rather than restore when we can. We may have a better appreciation of this work, not only from the selfless hours of construction, but for how it was done. Frank lived from 1909 to 1986, a generation that still had more than a hint of the pioneering spirit where you used what was available to create something, rather than take a trip to the hobby shop. The houses were made from cardboard, maybe from the cardboard that came in laundered shirts and other packaging. Frank made the trees from soda straws and cotton. There is no plastic anywhere in this creation. Much of the substrate had risen and cracked and rather than replacing it, Lynda meticulously glued the many cracks back in place and contributed the artificial grass, paint and time to retain as much of the originality of Frank's creation. We believe the key was hand lettered by Steve Jordon, which was also suffering the effects of time so we mounted it under clear plastic to give it a few more years.

In addition Frank's craftsmanship is an example of his attention to detail as far as the scale of the distances and sizes of the buildings. One must wonder if Frank actually went through town with a tape measure. I'm sure he would have been welcomed. Far to the right is a small building just labeled "saw mill". If Frank indicated a stream it was lost in the deterioration so we took some license to indicate the stream in blue as indicated on maps. Part of Frank's legacy leads us to realize that Charlton was not the residential district it is today. There were businesses, trades, and professions that met all of the needs of the townsfolk and neighboring crossroads. You could live right here and have all your basic needs met. Notice the blacksmiths, leather and tanning, tavern, store, and farms that also sold produce. See the sheds by the Churches. Since there were no cars back then, you protected your horse and buggy in the shed while attending the long services. This was especially favored in inclement weather. Trace some steps around town and experience a different world of the smells of animals, fresh mown hay, coal and wood stoves, tanning and leather pungency. There were sounds of hammers on anvils, horses hooves, creaking wagons and town chatter in the general store, church bells on Sunday. See roads not paved and muddy in rain. Roads not plowed, but rolled flat for sleighs in winter. Thank you Frank Lafforthun.
